

2022 was a year of re-emergence. With the pandemic mostly behind us, Cleveland Public Library moved forward with a renewed commitment to lifelong learning and to find new ways to serve our community.

Through author talks, community conversations and programs for all ages and interests, we have created safe spaces where the love for reading and quest for knowledge can flourish. Our vision is to put opportunity in reach of all Clevelanders. Through a partnership with Cleveland Metropolitan School District, we were able to create greater access to materials, resources and ideas by making their students ID cards function as library cards. A library card can open many doors to discovery and provide students with resources they might otherwise not be able to access.

At the end of 2022, we announced the city-wide Cleveland READS initiative with a goal to read 1 million books and 1 million minutes. A city that reads is a city that succeeds! By working together, we can increase literacy, build a culture of reading, and improve lifelong outcomes for Cleveland residents so they can secure a brighter future and access greater opportunities.

In 2017, voters approved a levy to invest in Cleveland Public Library. In a promise to our community, we launched the Facilities Master Plan (FMP). This 10-year project will reimagine every one of our 27 branches.

2022 has been a year of great progress in delivering on that promise with the reopening of the Jefferson Campus, the very first location to be renovated and reopened, and the unveiling of the new Hough Campus shortly after. Whether you're a regular, or just stopping by, we invite you to explore Cleveland Public Library. Individual meeting rooms and large community rooms can be reserved. 24/7 book lockers allow patrons to stop by at any hour to pick up holds. Cricut machines, button makers, and printing services can be useful resources for those looking for a creative outlet or trying to launch a small business.

We strive to provide the best experience possible to our community by providing services at all locations, including those that have not yet been reached by the FMP. We continue to provide new services such as the Neighborhood Court Kiosk. This partnership with Cleveland Housing Court allows people to virtually access housing court hearings without traveling downtown. In partnership with Verizon and JumpStart, a brand-new tech space opened at the Fulton Branch providing free technology training to Cleveland residents for STEM learning and job development. We cannot wait to create more opportunities for our patrons and share updates as we renovate, rebuild, reimagine, and soon enough, reopen!

New **BEGINNINGS**

Cleveland Public Library celebrated new beginnings in 2022. Library staff, city and community leaders, and patrons joined us for the grand opening of our reimagined Jefferson Campus and Hough Campus. The celebration at the Hough Campus included a conversation with world-renowned poet Nikki Giovanni.

While Jefferson and Hough opened its doors, patrons at four neighborhood branches said so long for now as construction began at their Libraries: Martin Luther King, Jr., Brooklyn, Rockport, and Eastman.







Community PARTNERSHIPS

In 2022, Cleveland Public Library formed new partnerships and broadened existing ones to provide more access to our services.

Cleveland Metropolitan School District (CSMD) students can now use their school ID or CMSD-issued RTA passes to check out books and access other materials at our locations.



In collaboration with the Library's CPL Play program, NFL star Denzel Ward and his foundation, Make Them Know Your Name, hosted an esports free play and tournament at our Main Campus. Powered by Union Home Mortgage, professional gamers and local esports coaches offered tips and tricks and expert advice on career opportunities in gaming. Top gamers from the Cleveland Metropolitan School District participated on Super Smash Bros. Ultimate in a tournament to win college scholarships. The Make Them Know Your Name Foundation strives to help prevent heart related fatalities in communities across the nation. The Foundation provides resources to educate people about heart health.

Denzel Ward and his family experienced first-hand the unexpected loss of their patriarch, Paul G. Ward, Jr., to cardiac arrest. He was 46 years old. His premature death left behind a purpose and a legacy to continue.

Kids Café

Cleveland Public Library continued to feed children through our Kids' Café Program. Our locations provided nutritious meals from the Greater Cleveland Food Bank.

RTA Community Immunity Bus

Public libraries are hubs for a host of resources including COVID-19 vaccinations and at-home test kits. Thanks to the Ohio Department of Health, Cleveland Public Library staff handed out thousands of Abbott BinaxNOW Rapid, At-home, COVID-19 test kits through the Main Library drive-up window.

In partnership with the Cleveland Department of Public Health (CDPH) and the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority (GCRTA), the RTA Community Immunity Bus Tour stopped at the following neighborhood branch libraries: Carnegie West, Martin Luther King, Jr., Memorial-Nottingham, Rice and Rockport. Medical staff provided free Pfizer and Moderna vaccines to adults and children. The RTA Community Immunity Bus was made possible by Ohio Department of Transportation.

Bridge the DIGITAL DIVIDE

In its efforts to bridge the digital divide in the city, Cleveland Public Library provided access to low-cost internet services in the Central neighborhood as well as opened the first Cleveland Neighborhood Housing Court Kiosk at the South Branch. Clevelanders who can't make it downtown for their court appearance can now use the kiosk.

The new Verizon Community Forward Learning Center at the Fulton Branch offers free technology-focused training to Cleveland residents for STEM learning, industry-specific job development and small business growth. And the Library received a \$3.25 million grant from the Jack, Joseph, and Morton Mandel Foundation for the creation of a Digital Innovation Center at the Glenville Branch.

TechCentral 10-year Anniversary & My Digital Life



Cleveland is a city that reads! In collaboration with Cleveland Mayor Justin M. Bibb and 30 community partners, Cleveland Public Library launched the Cleveland READS challenge with a Book Bash at Public Auditorium. The family fun event consisted of a book giveaway by the American Federation of Teachers and the Cleveland Teachers Union, Storytime with Kelly Starling Lyons who wrote *Ty's Travels*, live music, roller skating, and cool prizes.

The goal of the citywide reading challenge is for the entire city to collectively read one million books and/or one million minutes in 2023. Readers will win fabulous prizes and a lifetime of positive results.
















Nurture a Love of **READING**




Cleveland Book Week





People & Space

Cleveland Public Library is at the center of people and space. We create safe environments for thought-provoking conversations. Our Employee Resource Groups held a variety of programs to engage the staff and public. The Library also hosted an outdoor series called No Ceiling for young professionals. It was a safe space for people to network and engage in discussions about mental health, social justice, culture, and more.





Arts & Culture

Cleveland Public Library inspired our community through the discovery of arts and culture.

In 2022, the Library served as a venue for FRONT International 2022: Cleveland Triennial for Contemporary Art (FRONT 2022). The theme, *Oh, Gods of Dust and Rainbows*, was based on a poem by Langston Hughes. The Library hosted installations by six artists: Jace Clayton, Andrea Carlson, Moyra Davey, Paul O'Keeffe, Kameelah Janan Rasheed, and Karel Martens.

The Library's Literature Department staff curated an exhibit titled *Langston Hughes: In Cleveland, In Context*, on the 3rd floor of the Main Library. It contained a series of facsimiles that traced the editing evolution of Langston Hughes's poem *Two Somewhat Different Epigrams*, which inspired FRONT 2022. In collaboration with LAND studio, the annual See Also public art series in the Eastman Reading Garden featured a series of colorful, playful sculptures titled *On End* by New York-based artists and designers Yeju Choi and Chat Travieso. The installation was composed of hundreds of custom-made bookends—common objects in every library.

An extension of the See Also project can be found in the form of art walls at two neighborhood branches: The Harvard-Lee Branch mural, by Cleveland illustrator and designer Sequoia Bostick, is titled *Refresh the Soul*. Cleveland-based artist and architect Andrew Reach created *Quadratalux*, an abstract 3D art wall on the South Brooklyn Branch.

ArtBox

Cleveland Public Library opened the ArtBox in AsiaTown's Pop-up Park in the Midtown area of Cleveland. The mobile library and art space featured local artists and family fun activities over the summer months. Cleveland artist Chi-Irena Wong painted the exterior of the ArtBox with playful images of characters enjoying Dim Sum and books.

Ohio Library for the Blind & Print Disabled

LSTA Federal Aid of \$234,000 and State Aid of \$1,274,194 for providing services for the blind and physically disabled.


