

## **Dear Felton Thomas**

I have just returned from an extended visit to the USA and Canada, visiting several Dickens Fellowship branches, and, of course, attending the 104<sup>th</sup> Dickens Fellowship conference, hosted by the Cleveland branch.

From a great many wonderful experiences and impressions, the visit to *The Inimitable Boz* exhibition at Cleveland Public Library on 3 August stands out as a memorable combination of hospitality and scholarship. We were welcomed most warmly by Holly Carroll, and we very much enjoyed the contributions and company of Jean Collins, Amy Dawson, Tim Phillips, Steve Capuozzo, Doug Westerbeke, Rhonda Green, and other very helpful and friendly library staff.

Members of our Fellowship were overwhelmed by the range of subjects covered by the exhibition, by the variety of aspects of 19<sup>th</sup> century social history which were presented, and above all by the tremendous *zest* for the subject matter evident in every display.
